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Illuminating Variant Readings

Luke 6:35, Revised Standard Version:

But love your enemies, and do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return.

Luke 6:35, Syriac Peshitta:

But love your enemies, do good to them, lend to them, and do not cut off any person's hope.

Most witnesses have, "love your enemies, do good to them, and lend expecting nothing in return" (μηδὲν ἀπελπίζοντες). However, a very few (e.g. W Ξ sys) have a text that supplies a personal object for the verb (μηδένα), thereby requiring a different meaning for the verb, "to disappoint," or more literally, "to cut off one's hope." The Peshitta and the Sinaitic manuscript of the Old Syriac clearly share this distinctive text.

Daniel 11:16, Revised Standard Version:

But he who comes against him shall take the actions he pleases, and no one shall withstand him. He shall take a position in the beautiful land, and all of it shall be in his power.

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
Daniel 11:16, Syriac Peshitta:


The one who comes against him will do whatever he pleases, and none will stand before him. He will arise in the land of Israel, and it will be delivered into his hands.

Where is "the beautiful land?" The apocalyptic prophecy of Daniel 11 is ambiguous in the original Hebrew, but the Syriac version of the text provides a clear answer.





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




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


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



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


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

Written in a style designed for beginners, Kiraz avoids technical language and strives for a reader-friendly inductive approach. The letters are introduced a few at a time and are reviewed in a way that reinforces their identity. Students are next introduced to the concepts of gender, number, and tense as well as how they appear in Syriac. The often-troubling prefixes and suffixes of the language are lucidly explained, and readings from actual Syriac texts allow the student to experience the language firsthand. Various genres and literary forms are introduced in this section. Bonus words are added at each stage to build an effective vocabulary as the reader works through the lessons. Additionally, detailed verbal paradigms make this very practical introduction a must-have for any beginner in Syriac. Glossaries of grammatical terms and Syriac-English comparisons make this book ideal for a textbook in beginning Syriac. Readings of the text passages are available online.

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


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
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
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
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





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

Appositely named *Intiṣār*—meaning both 'victory' and 'defense'—Abū l-Ḥusayn al-Khayyāṭ's book is the refutation of a refutation and an angry polemic against much else, including Muslims and non-Muslims, atheists and freethinkers. Above all, it is a demonstration of the dialectic method praised by the Mu^ctazili school as the sole correct method of truth-finding in matters relating to God, to physics, to ethics, and to politics. This book priovides an English translation of this work of classical Arabic theology, accompanied by the Arabic text and and an introduction that focuses on the religious and intellectual milieu that informed al-Khayyāṭ's writing, the sectarian environment where he lived, and the culture of debate in which he participated.

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An Amerind Etymological Dictionary

An Amerind Etymological Dictionary is a revision, extension, and refinement of the lexical and grammatical evidence for the Amerind linguistic family that was initially offered in Greenberg (1987). The evidence is presented in terms of 909 etymologies arranged alphabetically according to the English gloss. Each etymology begins with the English gloss followed by a hypothetical phonetic form from which the individual Amerind forms are presumed to have derived. Within the body of each etymology, the evidence is arrayed in terms of the thirteen branches of Amerind. The complete classification of all Amerind languages considered is given in the back of the book.

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
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"And the Records are Ancient"

A Literary Analysis of the Genealogies of Judah in Chronicles By Neriah Klein

The book of Chronicles has received a revival in recent scholar-ship, making it one of the most studied books, and this is especially true from 1 Chronicles 10 onwards—ignoring the genealogies of 1 Chronicles 1-9. The Chronicler's genealogies contain seemingly endless lists of names, with neither intriguing plot nor sublime poetry, and thus hardly generate interest in the reader. Yet, when the Chronicler incorporated these lists into his book, he designed them with a deliberate and sophisticated literary design according to his purposes. In "And the Records are Ancient": A Literary Analysis of the Genealogies of Judah in Chronicles, Klein takes the reader deep into the genealogies of the tribe of Judah (1 Chron 2:3–4:23) to expose these designs in all their glory and show the great richness inherent in seemingly boring texts.

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

odology employs two standard factors—lexical and contextual affinities—and adds specific rhetorical-analytical steps to analyzing allusions to Judges in Psalms. The study then applies the proposed methodology to the use of Judges 5 in Psalm 68, Judges 4–8 in Psalm 83, and Judges 2, 6–8 in Psalm 106 and notes overlap in the rhetorical goals of each of the three psalms.


The Muslim Floating Population and Cultural Forms in Contemporary China






Academic discourse about the ancient world renders Nubia all but invisible. Located at the nexus of the Nile Valley and savannah corridors, ancient Nubian peoples traded east African goods to Egypt, the eastern Mediterranean, and the Near East. The pow-

erful Kushite empire attained political hegemony over Egypt in its 25th Dynasty (ca. 760–656 BCE), which saw the Kushite pharaohs engaging in international displays of power in the Levant, bringing them into direct conflict with the Assyrian empire. Commentary on these clashes is recorded in the Hebrew Bible, while the Christian New Testament speaks of the conversion of a treasurer of the "Candace of the Aethiopians". This volume presents current research that centers Nubian history and archaeology and imparts this information from postcolonial and anti-racist perspectives. It seeks to broaden Nubiology's impact on Egyptological, classical, and biblical scholarship, while challenging scholarly biases and disseminating knowledge, expanding the understanding of African influences on the ancient world.


An Annotated Translation of Bustān al-ʿārifīn by Abū al-Layth al-Samarqandī

The tenth-century *Bustān al-ʿarifīn* is a manual for believers in which the jurist Abū al-Layth al-Samarqandī (from Balkh and Samarqand, d. ca. 986) offers counsel on religio-legal questions. The

text is composed of 159 chapters, most of which open with a question about Islamic law and answer it by offering contrasting scholarly opinions and then establishing where Hanafi law stands on the question. The strong moral character of Bustān al-'arifin derives from the aspiration of Islam to cover every possible human contingency, from birth to death and beyond, in the grace of God. Examples of the concerns in the text are whether one can have dealings with non-Muslims, when to invoke God in prayer, staying clear of exposing oneself to suspicion, the aversion to spitting in the mosque, the interpretation of dreams, and whether it is allowed to play the tambourine, kiss a child, accept a gift from rulers, or wail for the dead. Despite its considerable currency among past and present-day Muslims, little study has been devoted to Bustān al-'arifīn, much less a translation. The translation of the text is accompanied by an introduction to its literary and historical contexts and an accessible commentary exploring the larger themes encountered in the work.

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Shi'ite Rulers, Sunni Rivals, and Christians in Between

Muslim-Christian Relations in Fāṭimid Palestine and Egypt By Steven Gertz


The study of sectarianism in Islam and the study of Muslim-Christian relations are both sub-specialities attracting growing numbers of scholars in Islamic studies. Rarely, though, are these two fields put into direct conversation with

each other. In this work, Steven Gertz brings the two together to ask how the Sunni-Shi'a divide in Islam impacts Muslim relationships with Christians. Do tensions within Islam do more to help Muslim relationships with Christians, or harm them? Gertz goes about answering this through a historical study of the Fatimid caliphate in Palestine and Egypt during the fourth/tenth and fifth/eleventh centuries. He specifically works to understand how Fatimid religious principles (ascertained through the study of law) and politics (ascertained through the study of history) impacted Christians in light of Fatimid-Abbasid rivalry. In the process of doing so, he makes a valuable contribution to the study of Islamic religious identity formation as it concerns sectarianism within Islam and inter-religious relations with non-Muslims.

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Ten Measures of Beauty

commentator), food and meals in midrash, and peace studies.


A study of the Uralic and Yukaghir protolanguages, and an account of the history of Uralo-Yukaghir research, seeking to determine whether Uralic and Yukaghir are genetically related entities. The authors examine more than 350 lexical comparisons of Yukaghir with at least two Uralic subbranches, and attempt to establish phonetic

correspondences between the protolanguages. The similar typology, word order, relatively high number of common pronouns, some numerals, grammatical parallels, and very similar phonological systems, are all taken into account to support the existence of a hypothetical Proto-Uralo-Yukaghir language.

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Perspectives on Hebrew Scriptures and its Contexts contains volumes dealing with the study of the Hebrew Bible, ancient Israelite society and related ancient societies, Biblical Hebrew and cognate languages, the reception of biblical texts through the centuries, and the history of the discipline.

ble, Lexicologie et lexicographie syriaque, which took place at the 13th Syriac Symposium, held in Paris in July 2022. The volume is organised in three parts, encompassing the different interests of the contributors to this volume. It opens with a section called "Syriac Lexicology and Lexicography," which hosts lexicological and lexicographical discussions on aspects of the philosophical lexis found in Jacob of Edessa's Handbook on Logic (Daniel King). Section two, "Syriac and foreign lexis," explores specific aspects of the interaction between Syriac and some of its neighbouring languages. Section three, "Syriac and Neo-Aramaic," showcases papers on the contacts between Syriac and Neo-Aramaic varieties. With its multifocal approach, this volume brings together contributions from many different corners of lexicology and lexicography, and testifies to the richness of such subjects, which still offer scholars many possible approaches and research trajectories.



Sallara and his mother Elishbah lived through turbulent times: the "last great war of antiquity" fought between Byz-

antium and Iran, as well as the astonishingly successful Muslim Arab invasions, which led to the collapse of the empire of Iran and the rise of the new Islamic empire. Yet this holy couple, bound by their love for each other and for God, continued unperturbed by these events in quiet devotion to their faith and their local community, performing healings, exorcisms and other wondrous deeds. The account of their lives, published here for the first time, focuses on their small patch of northern Mesopotamia, now in southeast Turkey, and in particular on the two monasteries of Mar Awgen and Mar Yohannan, of which Sallara was the abbot and which still stand today, and on the villages round about, for whose inhabitants the monasteries served both as employers and as providers of all manner of social and divine services. This book, as well as presenting an edition and translation of the Syriac text, will explore this local world and how it fared in the fast-changing Middle Eastern region to which it belonged.

The system of petition and response was part and parcel of life in the Roman Empire. This book contextualizes Justin Martyr's Apologies within this system of petition and response, arguing that Justin, in a fertile moment in the history of administrative practice, took a well-scripted

form of imperial supplication and public display and boldly transformed it into a uniquely stylized statement of voiced injustice and Christian transparency. Using the heuristic of performance, this book not only compares the Apologies to extant petitions but draws attention to Justin's strategies of elaboration and to the qualities of his work as a staged enactment within wider political, social, and literary contexts. The result is a reading of the Apologies as an opportunistic combination of petitionary, apologetic, and protreptic discourses by which Justin sought to address both his procedural objections to Christian trials and the popular and philosophical prejudices of his learned contemporaries.


How the Jewish and Christian communities that emerged in the early Roman Empire navigated a 'Hellenistic' world is a longstanding and unsettled question. Recent scholarship on the intellectual cultures that developed among Greek speaking subjects of Rome in the so-called

Second Sophistic as well as models for culture and competition informed by mathematical and economic game theories provide new ideas to address this question. This study offers a model for a kind of culture-making that accounts for how the cultural ecosystems of the Roman Empire enabled these religious communities to win legitimacy and build discourses of self-expression by competing on the same cultural fields as other Roman subjects. By considering a range of texts and figures—including Justin Martyr, Tatian, the 'second' Paul of the Acts of the Apostles, Lucian of Samosata, 4 Maccabees, and Favorinus of Arelate—this study contends that competing for legitimacy enabled those fledgling religious communities to express coherent cultural identities and secure social credibility within the complex milieu of Roman Imperial society.


An Inventory of Syriac Texts Published from Manuscripts in the British Library

The British Library possesses one of the most important collections of Syriac manuscripts in the world, with large numbers dating back to the second half of the first millennium CE. The publication of important Syriac texts from these manuscripts has been going on for

some 180 years and still continues. The aim of the present volume is to provide a guide to these scattered publications: following the sequence of the shelf-marks (call numbers), for each manuscript indication is given of what texts have been published from it. For convenience, a concordance between Wright's Catalogue numbers and shelf-marks is provided, along with a list of palimpsests and of joins with manuscripts in other libraries, in particular with those still in the Library of Dayr al-Surian in Egypt, the monastery which was the source of over 500 manuscripts and fragments purchased by the British Museum in the mid nineteenth century.

A comparison of these texts with Umayyad and 'Abbasid papyri reveals that the Prophet's documents reflect obsolete or otherwise unattested formulae. This study will demonstrate through three case studies the particular functions of these documents in the history of social relations in late antique Arabia.

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




Calling Out to Isis

The Enduring Nubian Presence at Philae By Solange Ashby

The expansion of the cult of the goddess Isis throughout the Mediterranean world demonstrates the widespread appeal of Egyptian religion in the Greco-Roman period. In this monograph, Ashby focuses on an oft-neglected population in studies of this phenomenon: Nubian worshipers. Through examination

of prayer inscriptions and legal agreements engraved on temple walls, as well as Ptolemaic royal decrees and temple imagery, Ashby sheds new light on the involvement of Nubians in the Egyptian temples of Lower Nubia, and further draws comparisons between Nubian cultic practices and the Meroitic royal funerary cult.


Sepiru Professionals in Mesopotamia in the Neo-Babylonian and Achaemenid Periods

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
A Mesopotamian Miscellany

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
Jerusalem's Survival, Sennacherib's Departure, and the Kushite Role in 701 BCE

An Examination of Henry Aubin's Rescue of Jerusalem By Paul Robertson

In 2002, award-winning Canadian journalist Henry T. Aubin published *The Rescue of Jerusalem: The Alliance Between Hebrews and Africans in 701 BC*, exploring Jerusalem's survival in the face of an Assyrian inva-

sion of the Levant. The rationale for a book-length collection devoted to Aubin's *The Rescue of Jerusalem* is, first of all, the importance of the issues it raises for the academy and beyond. This volume brings together excellent scholars from several fields to consider certain issues that are raised by *The Rescue of Jerusalem*'s thesis that an army of Egypt's Twenty-fifth Dynasty was influential in saving Jerusalem from destruction; the dynasty was composed of Kushites, who came from present-day Sudan. This volume is important for another reason. Not only does *The Rescue of Jerusalem* raise issues regarding what may have happened in 701 BCE, it also probes Western biblical scholarly attitudes regarding the Twenty-fifth Dynasty's involvement in those events. Aubin's approach raises important concerns about scholarly attitudes, not only from the past, but also about the ways in which past attitudes have a way of continuing to color later academic discourse when they are not challenged.

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


Death and Burial in Iron Age Israel, Aram, and Phoenicia

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
The Cyclops Myth and the Making of Selfhood




Commending Christianity within Islamic Culture

'Ammār al-Baṣrī (d.c. 850) was the first Christian to write a systematic theology in Arabic, the language of the Muslim rulers of 'Ammār's Middle East. This study of his two works that were only discovered in the 1970's seeks to analyse the way he de-

fends Christian beliefs from criticism by Muslims over the authenticity of the Gospels, the Trinity, the divinity of Christ, the Incarnation, the death of Christ by crucifixion, the resurrection of Christ, and the nature of the afterlife. 'Ammār al-Baṣrī wrote his theology in dialogue with Muslim thinkers of his time and his work offers guidance to Christians in today's world who live in Islamic contexts in how to relate Christian convictions to a Muslim audience.


Self, nation and church in dialogue and practice

George was one of the last scholarly Syrian Orthodox bishops to live in the early Islamic period. His metrical homily, probably composed to be sung during the consecration of the Myron, is presented here with the vocalised Syriac text and English translation on facing pages.

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
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


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


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


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
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
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
